

To celebrate this, the library has bought more than 40 new romance books that are on display now.



















































Miss Marsh's reccomendation:



The Song of Achilles - Madeline Miller

'The Song of Achilles' is a retelling of Homer's Iliad from the perspective of Achilles' lover, Patroclus. It is an LGBTQ+ love story



set in the ages of Ancient Greece, which is based around the story of the war over Troy. Achilles 'aristos achain' (the greatest warrior of his time) is destined to invade Troy's walls and assist in the claiming back of Helen, who was kidnapped from her husband. Patroclus, an exiled young prince, is sent to Achilles' father as an exile as he is not fit to rule and Achilles claims Patroclus as his companion and takes him to war. The two grow to love each other, though it is forbidden by Achillies' sea nymph mother. Despite this, they grow up together whilst the fear of conflict looms over their heads. This story is one of my favourite retellings of Greek mythology. Madeline Miller has written other similar novels, such as Circe, a story based on a nymph daughter of titan Helios who was banished to the island of Aiaia for witchcraft.







Faith Cresswell's Valentine's Classic...

Pride & Prejudice - Jane Austen

'Witty, smart, and challenging, yet romantic, vivacious and entertaining, 'Pride and Prejudice' not only delves into an unlikely romance between two opposing characters, but simultaneously criticises Victorian society. The novel follows the character development of Elizabeth Bennet, who, due to her father having no male heir to inherit their estate, must find a suitable husband. Unlike others in the book, Elizabeth strives to find a genuine, loving partner, and not someone her social superior, of whom she can gain status and wealth from. Alongside setting an example to younger readers of what love in matrimony looks like, Austen also plays on traditional gender stereotypes that marginalised women into objects of beauty, by making Elizabeth an outspoken, intelligent young woman who depends only on herself. Austen additionally attacks the social hierarchy and martial expectations of the period. As Elizabeth refuses to be swayed in her beliefs by a large fortune, and reject proposals from men who think that, simply because they are above her, she should give up her petty desires and make the arrangement efficient for them by just saying 'yes'. After all, 'what are men to rocks and mountains' anyway?'
